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Display your House Numbers

One night in January, an ambulance drove into Gulf Hills and turned onto Ridge at the south entrance and drove almost to the other end of Ridge,



then backed into a driveway to turn around. In hopes of helping them, a resident stopped beside the ambulance and asked where they needed to go, They gave him the address on Ridge and said they could not find the house number on the mail box or house. Shortly, it was discovered that all the house numbers on the mail boxes are on the North side of Ridge. A north bound vehicle would not see the house numbers unless they turned and went south. Yes, they had a GPS address locator, but addresses need to be verified. To help emergency responders, delivery drivers, and visitors locate your home, consider the following:

In the early actions of the Jackson County Planning Commission, a grid strategy was created that gave non-sequential addresses on streets in newly developed areas.

In Gulf Hills, we have too many instances where the same house number is used on more than one street.

We are a landscaped, lovely community that lends to creative mailbox plantings.

The house number should be on the house, not just on the mailbox.

Place your house number on the front of your mail box and/or on both sides.

Oh, the ambulance did find the house they needed to go to, but it was a slow process of driving by the homes, one by one in search of that house number. It all turned out well then. Let's not risk the delay. Make sure your house number is visible.

Please report outages or malfunctioning streetlights to Mississippi Power at 800-487-3275. Give the address closest to the light. The Gulf Hills Lighting District is being charged for each light, working or not.

Recently, several residents have complained that MS Power has not responded to their reporting of malfunctioning lights. If you have a malfunctioning or

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SPeeDIng **Awareness is the Next Step**

The survey is complete, and the answer is in. Your neighbors have noticed you speeding along main roads and side roads and running stop signs. If it wasn't you, then certainly someone in your household, or maybe it was a contractor

working at your home? No, then maybe it was the school bus that they noticed. In any case, quite a few drivers in Gulf Hills are not fully



aware they are causing concern amongst residents.

There will not be radar enforcement or speed bumps any time soon. So, for now, we must become more aware of our driving habits. While talking with our contractors about not littering our streets, we can remind them to observe the speed limits. If you happen to know one of the school bus drivers, let them know that we appreciate their work, but try to work a little slower.

To help with our vehicle speed awareness, the Jackson County Road Department will be making available a portable speed alert message sign. While keeping our eyes on the road, we are not necessarily noticing the value on the speedometer. From our recent survey, we know which roads are of most concern. Along these roads, we'll need a volunteer resident yard or two in

which to place this sign. If you are willing and think it may be a good fit, please send an email to President@gulfhills.org. Whereas this device is not used for policing and enforcement, it will collect data on vehicle traffic numbers and speed.

Gulf Coast Box Turtle Range & Habitat

The most common turtle found in Gulf Hills, the Gulf Coast Box Turtle can be found along the Gulf of Mexico. They can only be found from Florida to Louisiana along the coast. With the warmer weather approaching they will soon be moving around looking for mates and food. During hotter weather they will be active during early morning and after rain showers. When I see one crossing the road here, I usually pick it up and put it across the road in the direction it was travelling. Unfortunately, people will sometimes try to take it home and release it in their yard, but the box turtle will try to get back to its home range and will often get run over.

This subspecies of box turtle loves to be around water, in Gulf Hills we see them crossing roads, in our yards, and even on our patios begging for food. They like shallow waters that maintain a consistent water level throughout the year. While they are not aquatic and do not live-in water, they like to travel to shallow waters often. Being so close to water also offers them a nice, consistent humidity. The semi-tropical nature of our community, such as the swamps and marshy areas around the golf course; offer reliable warmth for most of the year. If things become too cold, they will bury themselves and somewhat hibernate.

Shape or ID

Of all the sub-species of box turtle, the Gulf Coast Box Turtle is the largest. They have a large dome top shell (Carapace). Their skin and shell are often dark colored,



such as browns and blacks. Other sub-species of box

turtles are occasionally encountered here, but this is a result of human relocation.

Is it a Male or Female Box Turtle?

There are a few ways you can determine the gender of a Gulf Coast Box Turtle. The male's eyes will sometimes have a red iris while the females do not; this is one of the easier ways to sex the turtle. The other means of sexing may require having two turtles to compare side by side. Males typically have larger tails, both in length and girth; carapaces are more rectangular than round like females. You can also look at the (Plastron), the underneath or bottom shell. Males will usually have a concave curve to their plastron; this shape is to help them mount a female turtle during mating. Females tend to have flat plastrons.

Breeding usually takes place in March and April with the males engaging in violent combat for territory and breeding year-round. Unfortunately, it appears the female does not seem to have much choice in the mating process as the males are relentless in subduing them for mating. The female will carefully select her nest site around June and depending on environmental factors the eggs will hatch out in around eighty days.

Diet

As with many turtles, the Gulf Coast Box Turtle is an omnivore. This means it eats both meat and plant matter and must have both in its diet to stay healthy. They get their meat primarily from live insects that they hunt. This is one of the reasons they always live near shallow water, as this is a good breeding ground for many insects. They will hunt snails, worms, beetles, grasshoppers, slugs,

grubs, and virtually any insect they can find and capture.

The rest of their diet consists of plant matter and fungi, such as moss, grass, berries, fruit, and mushrooms.

Gulf Coast Box Turtle Lifespan

Like most box turtles, the Gulf Coast Box Turtle has the potential to live for a long time and have been recorded to reach a hundred years of age in the wild. When in captivity for most of their lives, this number is believed to diminish in most cases.

How can you Help?

All the deceased Box Turtles I have encountered in Gulf Hills were caused by being run over by a vehicle. I do not think people intentionally run them over, but people passing through, contractors, and delivery trucks might not have box turtles in their neighborhoods and are not tuned in to look for them; as the Gulf Hills residents are. We can all slow down, pay attention while driving, the object in the road might not be a pinecone, but a startled box turtle frozen in alarm; due to a large object approaching them. Try to inform our delivery drivers, contractors, and people visiting of our community. Turtle Crossing signs can be found online to put in yards to remind people of our little pre-historic neighbors.

Next newsletter we will look at identifying our common snake species found here.



I'd like to brag a little about a very old case that, after many manhours and much determination, we were able to solve in late 2020. On December 5, 1982, the body of an 18-month old toddler, who became known as Baby Jane, was found floating in the Escatawpa River. Over 38 years the case went cold as it passed from one investigator to another. Long story short, the child's body, which is buried in the Jackson County cemetery, was exhumed in 2009 to collect DNA samples. That technology wasn't widely available when the child was found. The samples were put into NamUS (National Missing and Unidentified Persons System) at the University of North Texas. A DNA lab in The Woodlands, Texas used the samples to build a genealogical profile, which led to the little girl's family in Missouri. Baby Jane finally had a name: Alisha Ann Heinrich. Her mother, Gwendolyn Mae Clemons, is still missing. The child's father is believed to be deceased, as is the man who Gwendolyn and Alisha left Missouri with on Thanksgiving, 1982. The case remains open as our investigators hope the identities will tell them what happened to Gwendolyn and the man described as her boyfriend. It's very gratifying that after so many years when it seemed we'd never have any answers, we could give the child's family some closure. I'm very proud of all of the investigators who wouldn't let this child and her mother remain nameless.

I am honored to serve as your sheriff. My staff and I are here anytime to help, so please don't hesitate to call. Have a great spring and summer!

Garbage Pickup Reminder

Rubbish Reminder

Rubbish (no-household garbage) pickup is scheduled for the second week of every month and all limbs and debris need to be put out by 7:00 am Monday of that week.

Limitations of Rubbish Pick-Up

The maximum volume of trash, trees, debris and/or vegetation that Jackson County may remove per pick-up per month is 3 cubic yards.
