FALL IS IN THE AIR!

The last week or so has brought some delightful weather to the Hills, and with that, our thoughts turn to bonfires, s'mores, football and gatherings with friends and loved ones! The GHCA has a busy fall and winter season planned for Gulf Hills, and we are looking forward to seeing our old friends and making new ones.

I am particularly excited to announce some upcoming fundraising events, focusing on improvements to the sign at the main entrance to Gulf Hills at Shore Drive and Washington Avenue. Over the years, this sign has fallen into disrepair and, despite attempts to put band-aids on it, is looking pretty shabby and doesn't present our community in the



best light. Although located in the county right-of-way, GHCA leases the land where the sign is located from the County and maintenance of the sign has been through efforts of volunteers, and the Garden Club has devoted a lot of time and effort keeping it up, but it needs a serious facelift! Making this sign an attractive entry to the neighborhood will take funds, and the Board is working to get designs drawn up and quotes for the work. Our first fundraiser for this project will be a fish-fry on October 15th and I hope you will all help us with this important beautification project. More details can be found in the Events and Activities article in this issue.

I am also pleased that the GHCA is bringing back several community events this fall, including Halloween in the Hills and Christmas in the Hills, as well as resuming the fall community yard sale, with another sign fundraiser associated with the yard sale. The Garden Club is also planning a plant sale in conjunction with the yard sale. We sure hope you will join us for these family-friendly fun events!

On a serious note, over the past several months The GHCA Board has heard from many of you regarding various issues related to safety, most notably, drivers who are speeding and running stop signs. This has become an incredibly dangerous problem in the neighborhood. While some of the offenders are nonresidents, many are our own neighbors. To help address this problem, we explored several options. Speedbumps or other types of barriers in the actual roadway are not encouraged by the county, for both maintenance and liability reasons. They are also not very cost-effective. So, we have been looking at other ideas. Be on the lookout this fall for increased patrols by officers with the Jackson County Sheriff's Department. We have also requested portable radar speed feedback signs be placed in the neighborhood in strategic places, to alert drivers of their actual speed. If you have a location that you believe is a particular speedway or dangerous intersection, or you want to volunteer to have one of these portable signs temporarily placed in your yard, please let a board member know so we relay that information to the Sheriff's Department. We will also be pre-selling yard signs with the saying "Slow Down Gulf Hills." More details to Remember, though, we ALL share the responsibility for driving safely in our neighborhood - please pay attention, be careful and encourage your neighbors to do likewise.

Continue page 1 President initiatives which will impact Gulf Hills over the next several years. Washington Avenue/HWY 609 will be improved from Cook Road north of I-10 to the Ft. Bayou bridge. These improvements will include adding curbs, gutters, and sidewalks. County is also aware of a number of dangerous inter-

sections along this stretch of road, and for that reason, will be re-aligning certain traffic signals and creating designated turn bays. A new entrance to the neighborhood is also being discussed, with a traffic signal for increased accessibility and safety. Although these improvements may cause some temporary traffic delays during the different project phases, the end result will be a vast improvement over the current situation. And, as mentioned in the previous newsletter, the construction of a bridge on Shore Drive at the Memorial Garden is set to begin in late 2023. As always, if you have a question or concern about something happening in the neighborhood or in surrounding areas, please feel free to contact a board member.

A new feature of the newsletter are Board member profiles. Check out some new and some very familiar faces. Once we have introduced the Board, we will be continuing with a "Meet your Neighbor" segment in each newsletter, where a Gulf Hills resident (or residents) will be spotlighted.

Meet Jesse Lancaster, Media, GHCA



Maintaining Gulf Hills Urban Forest Carroll Campbell

Gulf Hills has lost some of its valued trees recently due to development. The young families buying new homes will keep Gulf Hills thriving, so the lost trees can be regarded as a trade-off. A few trees removed here and there does not seem significant, but



they add up, and the attrition results nationally in a loss of 4 million trees per year. (Nowak, D.J.; Greenfield, E.J. Declining urban and community tree cover in the United States. <u>Urban Forest Urban Greening</u>. 2018, 32, 32–55.) While many city building codes require mitigation for removed trees, Jackson County currently has no tree ordinance in place. However, individuals can support urban forest restoration on their own.

Why do trees matter? For Southerners, trees connect us with our deep past and endow a legacy for future generations. They benefit property by beautifying, shading, and buffering our environs from wind and noise. Trees provide habitat for the charismatic wildlife important to many Gulf Hills residents. They clean our air. Scientific studies show the presence of trees is correlated with improved human health outcomes (Wolf, Kathleen, et al. International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health 2020, 17, 4371). Finally, research has been done into the potential relationship between urban forest and lower crime rates.

The practicality of a healthy urban forest is undeniable, but you may be wondering, "What should I plant, and where, and how?"

Look in your own back yard for native trees volunteering, though at some distance from your building, and simply let them grow. Consult an arborist if you are not sure of species.

If you plant, emphasize native trees in your landscape, as they love our sandy, acid soil, and can tolerate Gulf Coast weather conditions.

Plan for your tree: Research its height and girth at maturity, and plant where it will have space, light, and water to thrive. Have your soil analyzed for free by the MS Cooperative Extension service to ensure your tree can flourish in it. The younger and smaller your tree when planted, the more likely it will live and grow.

Plant a containerized tree, according to arborday.org guidelines:

Dig a hole 3 to 4 times the size of the container;

If the tree is root-bound, "cut an X across the bottom of the root ball and four vertical slices along the sides of the root ball with a sharp knife." (arborday.org)

Plant the tree so that the top of the root ball is slightly above ground level.

Fill and pack the hole around the tree with original soil.

Water the area around your tree well, and mulch with 2 to 4 inches of mulch, covering an area about 3 feet in diameter around the tree, but not touching the tree's base.

Water your tree. During its first year, watering every 7 to 10 days during dry weather is advised.

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Gulf Hills Azalea Triangle

Many of you who take Shore Drive to enter and leave Gulf Hills have noticed the poor appearance of the Azalea Triangle located across from the Memorial Garden. The large azaleas that have been there since the mid-1970s were beautiful, but over time, have become overrun with vines and The Gulf Hills Garden weeds. Club tried for years to control the vines, including in recent years, paying a landscaper \$1200 to eradicate them, which was not successful. Since the Civic Asso-



ciation has taken over the maintenance of the Memorial Garden and the Azalea Triangle from the Garden Club, we have also attempted to get this area under control. We hosted two work parties recently to prune the azaleas back to allow the landscaper to try again to treat the vines. That was also not successful, and the vines have come back with a vengeance! Along with the vines, the mound is full of torpedo and Cogon grasses and other broad leaf weeds, making the recovery of this bed to its former glory an impossibility. The Civic Association has struggled to come up with a way to control the vines and maintain the azaleas. A further setback to this area occurred recently, when the contractor hired by MS Power to spray herbicide on the woody growth under the power lines in Gulf Hills sprayed a broad swath of the azaleas in the triangle, badly damaging or killing over half of them.

The GHCA Garden Committee has met on several occasions to discuss appropriate steps for this section of the Memorial Garden. There are two main barriers to maintaining the azaleas. First, the vines are out of control. The roots of the vines are intertwined with the roots of the azaleas, thus the vines cannot be eradicated without also impacting the azaleas. Secondly, the invasive grasses are likewise difficult to eradicate within the existing plantings. The Garden Committee has resolved to remove the azaleas, effectively treat or remove the vines and invasive grasses, and then re-plant the triangle with some low-maintenance options. Prior

to moving forward with this plan, we consulted experts in horticulture with the Mississippi State University Extension Service. This expert advised the best course of action was to remove the azaleas, treat the ground and re-plant the area in the Spring.

In the next few weeks, you can expect to see some changes in the Azalea Triangle. You may have already noticed the daylilies in the front of this section have been removed to preserve them for transplant later, after all work has been completed. Various contractors will soon be hard at work removing all the azaleas and treating the soil to eradicate the vines, invasive grasses and weeds. The area will lay fallow for the fall and winter, and in the Spring, replanting will occur. We will select plants for this area based on a number of factors, including ease of maintenance, beauty, and safety. The contractor that sprayed the azaleas has offered to assist the GHCA financially in this effort, but we may be seeking additional funds through fundraisers and donations to help support our efforts.

Gulf Hills Garden Club has taken action to protect the Daylily Garden after a company was hired to spray an herbicide which killed many of the azaleas and other plants in the area known as the Azalea Triangle, near the Memorial Garden.



The Garden Club hired a contractor to remove the daylily plants, which club members potted offsite until the damaged plants in the triangle have been removed and the soil treated to kill undesirable vines and grasses. It's unknown how long the process will take, but the Garden Club will nurture the daylilies until the time is right for replanting in the Daylily Garden.

In conjunction with the Neighborhood Yard Sale on

November 12, the Garden Club will be offering pansies and snapdragons for sale at great prices. Stop by the Memorial Garden to purchase your plants, and help beautify Gulf Hills with fall flowers!

After many months of canceled meetings due to Covid, the Garden Club is resuming a monthly meeting schedule and looking forward to fun and informative activities. We have openings for membership. Contact Mary Ann Westfall, westfall2@reagan.com, if you are interested in joining the club.

also have year-round resident eagles). They will be repairing their nests, mating in late fall, and laying eggs at the end of December. The eggs will take a little over a month to hatch. The babies will grow to full size in about 3 months. Before summer the parents and eaglets will start travelling and wandering up North and up the East Coast. Mississippi has approximately 100 nests and 14 or so on the Coast.

The Bald Eagles construct the largest nests of any bird species with the largest ever recording reaching 10ft across and 20ft in height. The nests are more noticeable when they have eaglets to feed as they are continually travelling to the nest to feed their young and repairing and expanding their nest. Bald Eagles are mainly fish eaters but will readily dine on carrion. One of my neighbors sent me a short video of a Bald Eagle swooping down to chase a Red-Tailed Hawk off a roadkill rabbit by Gulf Hill's South entrance next to the road on Shore dr.

Of course, we all know what a mature Bald Eagle looks like, but it takes them five years to get the adult plumage. Juvenile Bald Eagles are often confused with Golden Eagles, but they are scarce here. A Golden Eagle will have feathers covering the whole leg while a juvenile Bald Eagle's feathers only cover half of the leg.

Rubbish (no-household garbage) pickup is scheduled for the second week of every month and all limbs and debris need to be put out by 7:00 am Monday of that week.

Limitations of Rubbish Pick-Up

The maximum volume of trash, trees, debris and/or vegetation that Jackson County may remove per pick-up per month is 3 cubic yards.
