

tions in which you can help them. One such example is if you find a box turtle crossing a road. This is a slow process for them, and they

often get hit. If you feel you can help them in a manner that is safe for both yourself and other drivers; you can save their life by moving them out of the road.

If you live in an area with a lot of wild box turtles, keep an eye out for them on the road so you don't hit them yourself.

Living Shorelines Carroll Campbell

Waterfront property owners have a clear interest in preventing erosion, and the traditional practice is to install a bulkhead to protect property from the action of the water. However, there



is an alternative that not only protects the landholder's economic interests, but also promotes the health of our ecosystem and fisheries while it beautifies the landscape, and that is a **living shoreline**.

What is a living shoreline? According to noaa.gov, a living shoreline uses "plants or other natural elements—sometimes in combination with harder shoreline structures—to stabilize coast estuaries, bays, and tributaries." They are otherwise known as "nature-based, green or soft shorelines." They work with nature, are highly protective, grow over time, and rarely need maintenance or replacement. (<u>https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/insight/</u> <u>understanding-living-shorelines</u>). Our US military takes living shorelines seriously: Keesler and MSU received a grant of \$6.48 million to construct 2.5 miles of living shoreline by Dec. 31, 2026 (<u>https://</u> <u>www.keesler.af.mil/News/Article-Display/</u>

Article/3238254/keesler-msu-shoreline-project-

receives-648-million/) Waterfront property owners in Gulf Hills are perfect candidates for this approach to shoreline stabilization.

What are the disadvantages of bulkheads? The Oceanography Society states that, "... These structures cause environmental harm while only temporarily preventing erosion. Their installation requires the destruction of important intertidal habitats, they increase erosion on neighboring properties, and they often fail within 30 years or less, requiring maintenance or replacement (Nordstrom et al., 2009; Dugan et al., 2018)." (<u>https://tos.org/</u><u>oceanography/article/reducing-barriers-to-living-</u><u>shorelines-through-sea-grant-extension-programs</u>)</u>

How much money can a living shoreline save me? Savings are quite variable depending on your site conditions and the materials and methods used. Installation is generally cheaper than or comparable to a bulkhead at the outset: According to Dr. Eric Sparks of MSU Extension, "my ballpark for MS would be \$50-\$200 per linear ft with the lower end basically being planting and the higher end being a breakwater plus planting." (email Dr. Eric Sparks to Carroll Campbell, 7.3.24). MS Dept. of Marine Resources quotes bulkhead costs as \$125 to \$200 per linear foot. (https://dmr.ms.gov/ wp-content/uploads/2019/07/Living-Shoreline-Cost-Comparison-Brochure.pdf) Significant savings will consist in repairs and rebuilds over time that you won't have to pay for. A 2021 study of the living shoreline at Camp Wilkes in Biloxi found that it "could have been more than 3 times as costly and still would have cost less than maintaining and replacing a bulkhead over 30 years." (https:// masgc.org/news/article/program-can-providematerials-for-living-shorelines-in-mississippi).

What are other benefits of a living shoreline? There are many! Your choice of living shoreline structure and materials will be sitespecific, and its benefits, therefore, will be specific to your site, but generally, living shorelines do the following, according to noaa.gov:

Prevent erosion by dissipating wave energy; Provide protection from major storms; Provide water filtration—

sediment and nutrient removal--increasing water quality

Preserve the "land-water interface," and therefore Provide estuary and thus habitat for shore birds and aquatic life, including post-larval shrimp and crab. If you love seafood and/or fishing, your living shoreline will support that (<u>https://www.noaa.gov/</u> <u>education/resource-collections/marine-life/life-in-</u> <u>estuary</u>);

Provide access to the water for humans and for land animals. MDMR Wildlife Patrol Office Roy Lipscomb says the following species are among those that utilize Gulf Hills marshes: osprey, herons, Gulf salt marsh snake, raccoons, otters, and turtles such as the endangered Alabama red-bellied cooter, redeared slider, diamond back terrapin, and box turtle.

I want a living shoreline for my property. How do I get started?

Tremendous support is available through the MS State Extension—at no cost to you until you hire a contractor! Here's the process:

Schedule an assessment—The team will gather measurements, aerial imagery and other info.

Approve a shoreline design—A custom design that accommodates your needs and protects your shoreline will be provided for your review.

Sign the Permit Application—MSU Extension will work with state and federal agencies to prepare your permit application and submit it on your behalf.

Hire a contractor to install your living shoreline.

The GHCA serves the Gulf Hills neighborhood in many ways

•Neighborhood Events. The GHCA hosts or organizes a variety of neighborhood events, including Halloween in the Hills, Christmas in the Hills (and the included Deck the Hills home decoration contest), Hoppin the Hills, Golf Cart parades, an annual neighborhood yard sale and neighborhood cleanup. We are continually looking for other opportunities to bring our neighbors together!

•Communications. The GHCA publishes a quarterly newsletter, which is e-mailed to each known household within the Gulf Hills neighborhood. Additionally, the GHCA has established a website <u>www.gulfhills.org</u> to serve as a resource for neighborhood residents for upcoming events and other items of general interest, and a social media presence on Facebook to provide further outreach specifically to members.

•Engagement with County and Public Officials. The GHCA has established and maintains a working relationship with public officials, including the county and utility district, allowing the GHCA to receive updates and in turn keep members informed of developments impacting or affecting the neighborhood and its residents.

•Memorial Garden Maintenance and Upkeep. The GHCA has assumed full responsibility for the maintenance and upkeep of the Memorial Garden located at the intersection of Ridge Rd. and Shore Drive. This beautiful garden can be enjoyed by all residents and is the site of various neighborhood-wide events.

•Safety and Security. The safety and security of the residents of Gulf Hills are a priority for the GHCA. The GHCA is active on many levels to increase the livability of our neighborhood, from street lighting and visibility, to increased law enforcement presence, to providing safety tips for pedestrians, bicyclists and operation of golf carts. The GHCA was instrumental in forming the Gulf Hills Lighting District, which pays for and monitors the LED street lights in the neighborhood. The GHCA continues to seek input from our neighbors and to develop new ideas for preserving the safe enjoyment of our community.

Red Fox Roy Lipscomb, Marine Patrol Officer, Mississippi Dept of Marine Resources

Red Foxes have a distinctive appearance and aren't easy to confuse with other animals in South Mississippi. Although they are common, they do a great job of remaining unseen. They are most active at night, late evening, or in the early morning hours.



The fields, wooded

areas, and brush in Gulf Hills provide the variety of habitat they prefer. They typically sleep hidden above ground, but they sometimes dig burrows or move into a secure area around human structures. They also create dens for raising their young, called kits.

Mating season for red foxes usually occurs in January or February, with a litter of anywhere between one and 11 kits born in March or April. I had many sightings this Spring of them in the neighborhood and like raccoons this time of year they have young to feed. The kits are born blind and helpless, cared for by both parents for as long as 12 weeks before they can venture out for short trips to explore the neighborhood. By fall, they are ready to leave the family unit and live on their own.

Red foxes prefer rodents, but they will also eat birds, amphibians, and fruit. Red foxes will also steal food from garbage cans, pet dishes, or scavenge whatever is around. Their ability to find food, even during the winter, is one reason why red foxes have a reputation for being cunning and smart.

Red foxes have adapted well to suburban and rural communities. While other large predators have been pushed away from human development, red foxes took advantage of the changed habitat.

The Homeless Under the Bridge

There are currently two State Agencies and three County Agencies working on resolving the homeless living under the Fort Bayou Bridge. MDOT has jurisdiction for the bridge and under it. Until the red tape is resolved we can help remedy some of it by not dropping off food, bicycles, and other items there. Even though people mean well this encourages more people to move under there. There are many safer and cleaner shelters in the area than living under the bridge.

Attract pollinators to your garden!

The Gulf Hills Garden Club has for many years planted and maintained the Butterfly Garden at the south end of the Memorial Garden, and recently registered this garden as a Monarch Waystation with Monarch-Watch.org.

This designation recognizes Gulf Hills Garden Club for creating and maintaining a

garden providing milkweeds, nectar plants and shelter for Monarchs throughout their annual life cycle of reproduction and migration. Our Monarch Waystation, number 47468, will be included in the national registry at MonarchWatch.org.

We encourage everyone to plant for all pollinators, in addition to planting specific milkweeds to help our Monarchs and other pollinators to thrive. The importance of pollinators cannot be overstated.

Did you know that it's estimated that one out of every three bites of food we eat is made possible because of pollinators? In addition to food, pollinators support ecosystems that clean the air and stabilize soil.

To encourage pollinators to visit your garden, you need plants that provide habitat for bees, butterflies, moths, beetles, hummingbirds and other pollinators.

Flowers provide nectar and pollen, while fallen fruit provides food for bees, beetles and butterflies. Specific plants are eaten by the larvae of pollinators, like the endangered Monarch butterfly, whose caterpillars rely on varieties of milkweed as their only food source.

Providing a diversity of plants supports a variety of



pollinators. Grouping plants will increase pollination allowing pollinators to transfer pollen to the same species of plants, while providing protection from predators as the pollinators move through your garden. Flowers of different colors, fragrance and bloom season will attract pollinators and provide pollen and nectar throughout the seasons. Herbs, such as oregano, chives, garlic, mint, parsley, dill and basil also attract pollinators.

Naturally, old fashioned flowers such as zinnias, cosmos, coreopsis, and sunflowers attract and support bees and butterflies, while providing a visual feast for the eyes.

Gulf Hills Garden Club encourages you to keep pollinators in mind when planning your garden. Happy gardening!
