Hello Gulf Hills Citizens!

Another Christmas season is behind us, it's a new year, and Mardi Gras is upon us. This may be the coldest Carnival season in recent memory, bringing with it some frigid temps a lot of us could do without. Up first on the parade

schedule is Ocean Springs, with the

February 15 day parade. Many more will follow, and our traffic deputies will be on the route of each one watching out for any safety issues.

We are happy to report that after nearly a year of establishing our own in-house forensics laboratory, we are getting faster results from drug testing. The lab is in Pascagoula, under the supervision of the South Metro Enforcement Team. Mississippi SMMET. Drugs seized by the narcotics officers are taken there to be analyzed, instead of being sent to the state crime lab in Jackson. Bypassing the state's backlog of cases means we get results within two weeks instead of having to wait two years or more. Cases go to trial sooner and the county isn't paying the state's crime lab fees, saving thousands of dollars a year. We really appreciate the Jackson County Supervisors helping us create the lab, which is proving to be an invaluable resource.

Many of you may have started working on your taxes. This is a popular time of the year when scammers are also hard at work coming up with ways to rob you. Please keep in mind that any calls you get from someone claiming to be from the IRS is a red flag. The IRS does their business by mail, not through phone calls. So, when "the IRS" calls, just hang up.

These scammers don't give up and we cannot stress enough how important it is to protect yourself. Whether it be a call from someone claiming that you skipped jury duty or failed to pay old fines, remember, they're calling to rip you off. Please don't fall for it and don't ever give your personal financial information to anyone. We also stress to keep your vehicles and homes locked. Don't give anyone a reason to help themselves to your personal belongings.

Thank you for supporting your sheriff's department. It takes citizens and law enforcement to keep our communities safe. We hope all of you have a happy and safe Mardi Gras and stay warm!

Gardening Wiles to Woo Hummingbirds Carroll Campbell

Hummingbirds are fleet, flirty, and quite adorable, a charismatic species that charms humans. The ruby- flowers suited to hummingbirds' throated hummingbird is the most likely hummingbird long, to be spotted in South MS, according to Robert F. Brzuszek of MSU. (http://extension.msstate.edu/ mended in the literature are red content/attracting-hummingbirds-mississippi-

gardens). Others identified here are the white-eared honeysuckle. (Ibid.) According to tarahummingbird, buff-bellied hummingbird, and blackchinned hummingbird. (http://extension.msstate.edu/ news/extension-outdoors/2014/attract-hummingbirdsnative-plants).

You can provide hummingbirds food, water, shelter, and nesting space to draw them. A good lure initially is a brightly-colored feeder, as they love flashy colors. If you use a one, clean it twice a week, preferably by boiling it, as soap can be toxic; for food, use a mixture of one part refined sugar to four parts water boiled together. (https://cdispatch.com/lifestyles/plants-andhabitats-to-attract-hummingbirds-in-mississippi/) However, a sugary lure is a mere "snack" in the hummingbird diet, providing quick, easy energy, but no nutrition (https://www.nurturenativenature.com/post/make-your-yard-asafe-hummingbird-habitat).

Hummingbirds require protein, which comes from insects-especially during nesting season. According to Brzuszek, the hummingbird diet is 95% spiders and flying insects--and 5 % hummingbird feeder fare or nectar. It must be stressed: Avoid pesticides and lawn chemicals, and encourage the growth of native plants and wildflowers, which support bugs hummingbirds need to thrive and rear young (https:// cdispatch.com/lifestyles/plants-and-habitats-to-attracthummingbirds-in-mississippi/).

Hardy and beautiful indigenous perennials are the best choice of plants to draw hummingbirds. They evolved to survive our climate and thrive in our soils. Plus, you won't have to re-plant each year. Try bee balm, blazing star, butterfly weed, canna, cardinal flower, and coral bells, according to Brzuszek. (Ibid.)

Choose plants with long, tubular specially adapted beak. Three natives especially recombuckeye, native azalea, and coral

wildlife.com, "red buckeye shrubs can grow to be up to 20 feet tall. It's native to the southeastern U.S...can tolerate a wide variety of soil types and moisture levels... grows best in part shade but...can grow in full sun as long as it is shaded in the hot afternoons."



Native azaleas are also highly recommended. Of 15 native species. two are early-blooming: the piedmont or honeysuckle azalea, and the Florida flame azalea. (http://extension.msstate.edu/news/

Piedmont azalea

southerngardening/2016/native-azaleas-shouldshine-bright-spring). Provide native azaleas with filtered sunlight, and well-drained, sandy, acidic soil. (lbid.)





A third plant Orange flame azalea is coral honeysuckle, a.k.a. trumpet honeysuckle (Lonicera sempervirens), which produces bright red flowers in spring, and bright red berries in the fall that are also bird food. (http://

Water MSU recommends providing a shallow water source. Add rocks or bricks to a bird bath to create a shallow pool, or buy a specialized bird bath. Hummingbirds also benefit from the cooling afforded by a mister. There are plenty of birdbaths and misters designed for hummingbirds--simply google.

Shelter While we think of hummingbirds as very active, constantly moving creatures, in fact they need landscape features for perching-for rest, or to monitor their territory for predators. Females especially perch in more protected areas, so allow clusters of shrubs to fill in here and there and make sure you landscape with a good native tree or two to provide some denser shade. http://extension.msstate.edu/content/ attracting-hummingbirds-mississippi-gardens;)

Nesting Space Hummingbirds prefer to nest in vines, shrubs, or trees, and compose their nests of "plant fibers, fluffy seeds, lichens, and spider webs," so allow for these in your yard. Allow for brushy, protected, and low-traffic "thickets" to emerge in your landscape to encourage nesting. (Ibid.)

Bufflehead Ducks Roy Lipscomb, Marine Patrol Officer, Mississippi Dept of Marine Resources

If you look in the waterways, especially around the Ft Bayou/ South Shore Dr entrance you will most likely see these small migratory waterfowl diving in the bayous



during winter. Bufflehead are widespread during their migration in winter. They will leave their breeding grounds in Alaska and Canada and migrate to our Southern waters. They move to the coast and large bodies of water, especially shallow saltwater bays. They breed near lakes in northern forests where conifers mix with poplars or aspens. Bufflehead nest in tree cavities and will utilize woodpecker holes already drilled out.

A female will lay eight to 10 eggs and incubates them for about a month before they hatch. Within the first two days of life, bufflehead chicks leave the nest and follow their mother to water. It's not uncommon for two broods to join or for a separated duckling to join another brood. While the mother will look after the chicks, the young generally forage for food by themselves. Bufflehead chicks can fly between 50 and 55 days old.

Bufflehead primarily feed on a variety of inverte-

brates, including insects, mollusks, and crustaceans. They also eat plant matter, such as pondweeds and seeds. Food is harvested by diving in shallow open water.

Successful Yard Sales generally require some thought and pre-planning. Be sure to have price stickers on most items and be sure to have lots of change and small bills.

YARD SALE TIPS

Be an early bird: Get started by 8:00, as yard sale customers like to start early to get the best deals.

People often ask, "What do you do in the Garden year. Club; what's the purpose of it?"

Well, in Gulf Hills Garden Club, we hold monthly meetings—August through May—meeting in a variety of places from public spaces to members' homes. Since our meetings are during the middle of the day, we also enjoy refreshments provided by members, which are always delicious and often with a theme. Our small club has a very enjoyable time, while accomplishing Garden Club business.

At many meetings we learn about garden topics of interest to our members, such as roses and how to propagate them, composting to enrich our gardens, dividing perennials, air-cleansing house plants, and learning all about Monarch butterflies and what to plant in your garden to help them thrive.
